It has also been wonderful to see students continuing to grow in confidence with their reading and writing. Our classrooms are full of energy, learning, and laughter — a true reflection of the great community spirit here at Woodstock.

Over the coming weeks, we will begin our planning for 2026 by developing our Annual Improvement Plan (AIP). Our focus will remain on building strong reading skills, supporting student engagement, and creating a positive learning environment where every child can shine.

What a wonderful success our Grandparents Celebration Day was! Our morning began with a delicious afternoon tea kindly supplied by our P&C— thank you for your generosity and support. Students did a fantastic job serving tea, coffee, and platters of food to our special guests.

After afternoon tea, students enjoyed asking their grandparents questions about what school was like when they were young. We heard some very interesting and funny stories about how things have changed over the years! This was followed by a shared reading session, where students and grandparents read stories together — a lovely moment of connection between generations. To finish our celebration, we

planted a tree as a lasting reminder of the day. Just like our grandparents nurture and help us grow, we will nurture these plants and watch them grow over time.


By wearing red, we join thousands of schools across the country in honouring Daniel Morcombe and promoting the importance of child safety and awareness.

Building Strong Reading Skills

We are continuing to focus on developing our students' reading skills, as reading is an important part of everyday life. There are two key components to becoming a confident reader—Word Reading (our ability to recognise and decode words) and Language Comprehension (our ability to understand and make meaning from what we read).

Together, these two components form what is known as the Simple View of Reading. Without both strong word reading and language comprehension skills, it can be difficult to fully understand what we read.

That's why, during our Explicit Literacy Instruction each morning from 9:00–9:30am, we focus on these essential areas to help our students become fluent, confident, and successful readers.



Attendance – Every day counts

Our current school attendance rate is 91%. While this is a solid effort, the recommended attendance rate is above 95% to ensure students are receiving the best possible learning opportunities.

Attending school every day helps children build not only their academic knowledge but also vital social and emotional skills such as communication, teamwork, and resilience. Each day at school is a chance to learn, grow, and connect with others.

We've noticed that Mondays and Fridays tend to have the lowest attendance, with averages falling below 90%. Let's work together to make every day count — every day really does make a difference!

School opinion Survey

Thank you to the 42% of parents who responded to the School Opinion Survey. This is vital information to help us plan and revise our current practises. We have received the results and value the feedback we received. Parents, students, and staff shared their thoughts on what is working well at Woodstock State School and where we can continue to improve.

Parents highlighted our caring and dedicated staff, with all agreeing that teachers expect their child to do their best and take a genuine interest in their wellbeing. Students also shared positive feedback, with all agreeing that their teachers help them and encourage respect for others. Staff reported that the school is a safe and supportive workplace where students are motivated to achieve their best.

Areas identified for further improvement include communication around how students are assessed, ensuring all voices are heard, strengthening student behaviour supports, and continuing to focus on staff wellbeing. Overall, the survey reflects a strong, caring, and high-expectation culture at Woodstock State School where every learner is supported to succeed.

Planning for 2026

Over the next few weeks, we will begin developing our Annual Improvement Plan for 2026. This plan aligns with the Department of Education's strategic vision and our own four-year strategic plan, which was informed by our 2023 school review. Our key focus areas will continue to centre on improving student reading outcomes and enhancing student engagement. The goal is to create a clear, practical plan that reflects how these priorities will look in action across our classrooms next year.

As previously communicated, our student enrolments are expected to decrease in 2026, which means some adjustments will be made to our staffing allocation, including teachers, teacher aides, and our business manager. These decisions require thoughtful consideration, and student achievement outcomes will remain the central focus throughout this process. These changes will be finalised over the coming weeks and shared with families before the end of the year. This planning is being completed in preparation for our Day 8 enrolments, where all staffing changes will be confirmed and finalised.

As part of these discussions, Mrs Baker has made the decision to focus on her home and farm life and will be finishing full-time teaching at the end of this year. We sincerely thank Janelle for her wonderful contribution to our school community. She will continue to be part of the Woodstock team as a relief teacher when available. We will be recruiting for a teacher to fill this position in 2026, which will be a part-time role (2–3 days per week), with the Principal teaching the remaining days in the Year 4–6 class.

<u> Prep/1/2/3</u>

In Prep to 3 we are working hard learning all about Poetic devices like rhyme, alliteration and onomatopoeia. Ask your student to give you some examples. They are having fun identifying onomatopoeia in every text we read!! In maths we are skip counting by 2, 5 and 10 as well as partitioning numbers (eg. 3+7=10; 15+5+20=40) and adding and subtracting. Year 2 and 3 are learning about trading and regrouping to add and subtract (eg. 157 – 49: you can't take 9 out of 7, so you have to regroup/borrow from the tens column). Subtraction is proving to be a challenge, but we are working hard. Year 3 are also learning about Probability with Mrs Johnstone.

In Technology students are learning to code. Prep to Year 2 need to write algorithms (steps) to move a character from one point of a map to another point ensuring they collect items along the way and Year 3 are creating a Guessing Game in Scratch 2 on the laptops. This is also preparing them for using the laptops in Year 4. Science is all about the properties of materials and they need to use their knowledge to design and make a lunchbox choosing the best materials and appropriate design features. Lots of hands-on learning so great fun!

Over the next few weeks we will be very busy with Parent-Teacher interviews, swimming lessons and assessments. Attendance is important to complete our learning and assessment and I would like thank everyone for the support you provide by getting your children to school daily as this makes my job easier.

Year 4-6 Mrs Janelle Baker

Our Year 4-6 students have made a strong start to the final term of the year.

In **English**, they are exploring a range of poetry written for different purposes and audiences. Students are learning how poets use rhythm, rhyme, and imagery to express ideas and emotions, and how language choices shape meaning and mood. They are reading, discussing, and responding to a variety of poems, building both their appreciation and understanding of poetic techniques.

In **Mathematics**, students are revising the four operations — addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division — and applying these skills to increasingly complex problems involving fractions, percentages, decimals, and, as the term progresses, algorithms and patterns. They are practising a range of strategies, clearly showing their working, and building confidence and precision as they strengthen the foundations that will support their learning next year.

This term, each year level is also taking part in a weekly probability session with Mrs Johnstone. These lessons have been a great success, with students enjoying hands-on activities and learning how to predict and explain outcomes using the language of chance.

Our Year 5 and 6 students continue to enjoy their online Italian lessons each week through Cairns School of Distance Education, where they are building vocabulary, confidence, and cultural understanding.

Across the School Health & Science

Term 4 sees us back in the classroom for our Health lessons. Students from Prep to Year 6 are learning about the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle.

Prep-Year 2 are focusing on physical activity, nutritious eating, and personal hygiene

Year 3-4 are exploring the Australian Guide to Healthy Eating and designing balanced meal plans

Year 5–6 are investigating different drink choices and how they affect health and wellbeing. Students have been both intrigued and surprised by the amount of hidden sugar found in many everyday drinks!

In **Science**, there's plenty of curiosity and creativity:

Prep-Year 2 are crafting clever carriers for Olly the Orange and Sandy the Sandwich, learning which materials make the best travelling companions.

Year 3–4 are looking at properties of materials and will soon be stirring up ochre experiments, testing water fastness and smudge resistance.

Year 5–6 are exploring reversible and irreversible changes through a series of mini-experiments leading to their own investigations.


Please note that students who join the Strings Program are expected to remain in the program until they complete Year 6, as this allows them to build their skills and confidence over time.
